Fall 2021: Form working group; identify data sources for application

Spring 2022: Make recommendations to address gaps.

Spring 2022 – Spring 2023:

Implement new or different processes to address gaps. Expand and engage network of stakeholders. Collect data.

Fall 2022 – Spring 2023: Draft the application.

April 2023: Submit the application.
